Council passes salary amendment Pay scale for Community Corrections receives approval

mmurdock@kpcmedia.com AUBURN — The DeKalb County Council and DeKalb County Community Corrections are back on the same page.

The council passed an amendment to the county's salary and hourly wage ordinance incorporating the pay scale for Community Corrections on second and third readings at Monday's meeting.

The amendment to the ordinance had passed by only a 4-3 vote on first reading at the July 2 meeting, Monday's vote came much more quickly and was 6-1, with Councilmember Bill VanWye against.

Councilmember Rick Ring said a misunderstanding occurred at the last meeting, mostly due to Community Corrections operating on the state fiscal year and the county going by the calendar year.

Some of the salaries in the Community Corrections budget showed increases of more than the 2.5 percent limit the council had asked of county department heads.

Since it depends on Indiana Department of Correction grants, however, Community Corrections follows the state fiscal year, which runs from July 1 to June 30. Its budget must be submitted in January.

"Council did not give any instructions as to the amount of raises or what we wanted to see in those budgets until June," Ring said. "You were done by the time we gave our instructions due to that fiscal year issue.

"I do apologize for the fact that there was a miscommunication last month. I understand what you're doing. You did everything correctly."

Community Corrections is preparing to move into its new facility. Construction will begin on the county farm property west of Auburn soon. Going from no building to staffing the new home for the program 24/7, many changes to staffing and work duties are needed.

"The positions that were outside the increase (recommended by the council) were new positions with new duties," Community Corrections Executive Director Kellie Knauer said. "Some of them were filled by existing employees who were promoted, but they were structured that way because of a much higher level of expectation."

Some positions won't be filled until April. Community Corrections received DOC funding for April through

BUTLER — The Butler Days Festival returns Thursday.

Town-wide garage sales will take place throughout the festival.

Festival events begin at 4:30 p.m. Thursday with a hog roast at Butler United Methodist Church. At 6:30 p.m., the church will host a concert featuring the Mylon Hayes family.

The DeKalb County Historical Society will lead a walk through Butler Cemetery at 6 p.m. Butler's finest — police officers and firefighters — will square off in the third annual charity softball game at 6:30 p.m. This year's game at Eastside's softball field will raise funds for the Butler Community Food Pantry.

Craft and food vendors will open at 10 a.m. Friday. The historical society museum, located at 201 E. Main St., will be open from noon to 4 p.m. There will be free face painting and a graffiti wall.

American Legion Post 202 will serve sausage and onion rings from 5-8 p.m. Lamb of God Church will host the Royer Brothers concert from 6-8 p.m. The fifth annual light parade will take place at 9 p.m., followed by a teen dance at 10 p.m. at the American Legion.

Saturday, the Butler Fire Department will host its pancake and sausage breakfast from 7-11 a.m. Butler United Methodist Church will host a 5K walk/run event at 8 a.m. The car show will take place from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday at Butler Church of Christ.

Throughout the day, there will be a bicycle stunt show, with scheduled times of 10 a.m., 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. The DeKalb County Horsemen's Association will offer tours through Butler from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m.

Jim Barron will perform his magic show at 10 a.m. in the entertainment tent. Scheumann Farm will have a petting zoo at 10 a.m. and Mark's Ark will feature exotic animals at 10 a.m. The petting zoo and exotic animals will be on Eastern Ave.

Christ's Church at Butler will host a fish fry from 4-7 p.m. Festival giveaways will be announced in the entertainment tent at 4:30 p.m. The American Legion will host Kim Robins in concert from 8-11 p.m.

County council considering job study

mmurdock@kpcmedia.com AUBURN — To pay people fairly and stay within your budget, you need to know exactly what they do.

The DeKalb County Council considered the idea of having a study done on the activities of all county employees in its monthly discussion with county commissioners in Monday's meeting.

"Differences in job titles between departments have been a frequent issue every year when we do the budget," Councilmember Rick Ring said. "We're trying to set our employees' salaries and be fair, and be able to pay what it takes to get good employees."

County Director of Human Resources Dotty Miller has asked department heads to submit job descriptions to provide a clear picture of what employees in each department do.

"A clerk in one department is not necessarily the same as a clerk in another department," Miller said. "That's why the job descriptions are so important as opposed to just the job title." Miller said a salary scale is also important, with proper pay levels for a person with considerable experience compared to a person with little experience.

If department heads provide job descriptions, much of the leg work will already be done and the county will save money. Miller said she has been quoted a price of \$27,000 for the study, which would take 6-8 months to complete.

"I'm speaking only for myself, but as we're doing the budget over the course of the next six weeks, I'm going to take into consideration what department heads have gotten those job descriptions in and done the preliminary work," Ring said.

He added that it's likely possible to use job descriptions from comparable departments in other counties as a model.

Commissioners also reported that grades for the three finalist firms vying for the chance to do the engineering work for the C.R. 56 reconstruction
